There are wish lists from the Veteran Medical Centers and Homes across Nebraska. Have you heard about the Purses for Homeless Lady Veterans? Take one out of your closet / tote and fill it with feminine hygiene products, personal care items, and snacks. You know all those soaps and shampoos you take from motel rooms? Place them into individual plastic zip bags, put them in the purse (please no mouthwash or fragrance items) along with beef jerky, dried fruits, bags of tuna, crackers, etc.

It's winter. A nice pair of gloves or a warm scarf would be nice. Just think of what you use and need and put it

There are 2.2 million female in the purse. You don't need a gigantic purse, but a nice one would be good. They are to be collected at Mid-Year Conference in Norfolk in January. If you don't make it to Norfolk, take it to one of the Veterans facilities or give it to one of the Department officers or District Presidents.

> Don't forget to say "Thank You for Your Service" to lady Veterans, too!

Another project is the plastic mats for Homeless Veterans. Save your plastic bags (make sure they are not biodegradable), fold them, and give them to the people who make the mats. For those who make the mats, please let our ladies know who you are so that we can get the plastic bags to you. You can also give them to Department Officers or District Presidents, too.



Nebraska Patriotism Fuels the Nation By: Amanda Washburn



When the Good Shepherd Funeral Home in Omaha posted an online obituary for Stanley Stoltz in the Omaha World-Herald inviting the community to attend the interment for the Vietnam veteran with no known family, they had no idea how far their request would reach. By the end of the day, people had shared Stoltz's obituary all over social media and there were numerous comments on his obituary thanking him for his service.

People from all over the nation became aware of the Vietnam veteran who would be buried in

Omaha, but had no family. Over the next week Nebraska Veteran Service Organizations, veteran support groups, and community members made it their mission to make sure that there were people at the funeral for Stoltz.

On Tuesday, November 27, the funeral for Stoltz took place at the Omaha National Cemetery. Stoltz was no longer alone, there were almost 2,000 people from all over Nebraska who converged at the cemetery. Most, if not all,

of the people in attendance had no personal tie to Stanley, they just felt a call to honor him. This soon became national news and tv stations and newspapers came to cover the story of how Nebraskans came together to honor a hero. Those attending the funeral were active duty and retired military members who displayed to this Nation that we never forget our veterans.

Facebook was a buzz with posts from people all over the country following the service. James Long from New York said, "From a Vietnam era veteran, Thank You Nebraska, you have made us proud!!!!!!!!!"

Joseph Oaks from Utah stated, "THIS is the America I know. This is the love the people have for our military and veterans. R.I.P. brother! Thank you for your service. Thank you, people of Nebraska, for the love shown to this vet!"

The accolades go on and on and speak volumes about the people of Nebraska.

Stoltz was a member of the Bennington Post 266 American Legion.

Thank you to everyone who attended the funeral and honored Stoltz and his service.



Legion Seeking to Open Up Membership

Membership eligibility in The American Legion is determined by Congress through the establishment of specific dates of declared hostilities in which U.S. military personnel were activated. Since its founding in 1919, membership in The American Legion has been open to veterans of World War I, World War II, Korean War, Vietnam War, Lebanon/Grenada, Panama and Gulf War/War on Terrorism.

There are at least 12 known combat operations that required an activated military personnel, such as the Cold War, Libyan Conflict and Persian Gulf Conflicts, and resulted in about 1,600 U.S. military men and women casualties. However, because these operations are unrecognized by the U.S. government as a period of war, those who served during these timeframes are not eligible for membership in The American Legion.

The American Legion's National Executive Committee passed a resolution during its annual Fall Meetings in Indianapolis Oct. 17 to change that.

Resolution No. 1, "Unrecognized armed hostilities recognition," calls on Congress to declare that the United States has been continuously engaged in a state of war from December 7, 1941 to present, and for Congress to direct the Department of Veterans Affairs to qualify a wartime veteran as any military service personnel who served honorably under Title 10 for at least one day from December 7, 1941 to present.

Following the passing of Resolution No. 1, the NEC adopted Resolution No. 2, "Unrecognized armed hostilities membership date change," which will change membership dates for The American Legion. This resolution will only be put in motion once the actions of Resolution No. 1 are approved by Congress. Once approved, membership in The American Legion will be open to the following war periods: April 6, 1917 to Nov. 11, 1918, and Dec. 7, 1941 to the date of cessation of armed hostilities as determined by the U.S. government.

The American Legion believes that membership in the organization should be extended to all U.S. military personnel who served on active duty during the hostile events that are not seen as a period of war.

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

At the end of November on "Giving Tuesday" I had the opportunity to represent The American Legion at a charity fair being hosted at my work as part of the Combined Federal Campaign (CFC). The CFC is the largest workplace charity campaign throughout the country and overseas that raises millions of dollars each year for approved charities thanks to donations from current and retired federal employees and active duty and retired military. Two American Legion programs that are approved to be included in the CFC are the Child Welfare Foundation (CWF) and The American Legion Endowment Fund.

Child Welfare Foundation (www.cwf-inc.org/)

The concept for the CWF started in 1952 when Dr. Garland Murphy, Arkansas Department Commander, approached The American Legion with an offer to make a substantial contribution to the organization; however, he wanted his donation to be used solely for the wellbeing of children. After much study and discussion on how to accommodate Dr. Murphy's wishes, the National Executive Committee (NEC) approved the establishment of the CWF in October 1953 and entered into a trust agreement. Upon the CWF's legal incorporation under the laws of the State of Indiana in 1954, Dr. Murphy assigned deeds to fractional mineral rights on nearly 10,000 acres of land



in the oil-rich Williston Basin in Montana and North Dakota to the CWF. In 1955, the CWF gave its first three grants totaling \$22,500. Since its inception, the CWF has awarded over \$15 million to organizations who contribute to the physical, mental, emotional and spiritual welfare of children and youth across the country.

Nebraska has benefitted from CWF grants throughout the years, including this year. Father Flanigan's Boys' Home of Boys Town was awarded \$35,000 for their project, "Boys Town National Hotline: Suicide Prevention and Mental Health Outreach." This project will fund 18 weeks

of online outreach in 2019 for the Boys Town Hotline. In addition, the Children's Hospital and Medical Center Foundation of Omaha was awarded \$12,000 for their project "Safe Sleep Education Program." This project will fund providing Halo Sleep Sacks to 1,500 hospitals in North America. American Legion Endowment Fund (www.legion.org/donate/endowment fund)

The American Legion Endowment Fund is almost as old as our organization itself. Started in 1925 by World War I veterans, the Endowment Fund has provided nearly \$29 million in financial assistance to disabled veterans and military families. Money donated to the fund is held in trust and carefully managed by the American Legion Endowment Fund Corporation, whose members are selected by the NEC. Income from funds invested is used to support programs under the Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation (VA&R) and Children & Youth (C&Y) pillars of the American Legion.

Under the VA&R Commission, several programs are funded in part by the Endowment Fund including Department Service Office School training, Board of Veterans Appeals training and representation from the National Veterans Legal Services Program through a memorandum of agreement with The American Legion. These programs ensure a cadre of highly trained and qualified individuals exists throughout the country who can assist veterans with navigating the challenge of the VA Claims process.

The Endowment Fund also supports the Temporary Financial Assistance (TFA) Program. This C&Y Committee Program was established to help veterans provide for the basic needs of their minor children when they have fallen on hard times and are unable to do so. These basic needs could include shelter, utilities, clothing, food and medical care. Thanks to the Endowment Fund, TFA can distribute more than half a million dollars annually to assist thousands of children across the country.

I chose to have my CFC contribution this year go to The American Legion Endowment Fund. The good news is, you don't need to be a federal employee or active duty military to donate to these worthy American Legion programs. Anyone can donate any amount at any time – just visit the websites listed above and click on the donate buttons. You tax deductible gift will go a long way to help our veterans and children in need.

(Eschatology & You)

Ever ponder what the "end" will be like? You know: when our Lord and Savior, Jesus, returns triumphantly to set things right again (Matthew 16:28)? In Biblical studies, this arena of inquiry is known as Eschatology: the study of the end times. It's Greek origins state eschatos as last, and ology as the study of.

This forecasting of the Parousia (Greek for "arrival" of Christ) or the "Rapture", has always been a stumbling block for human kind, considering that even Jesus himself didn't know the Father's timetable (Matthew 24:36). So, what's all the fuss about what only God the Father knows for sure? Well it has to do with preparation or how will you know when to be ready for His return?

If you further examine this field of end times forecasting, there is often some confusion with the issue of "last days" (2 Timothy3:1). Actually, we're currently living in those "last days" Scripture acknowledges. This period of Biblical reality began after Jesus' ascension (Acts 1:9).

The "end times" won't be happening until the "Troubles", the "Great Persecution", or the "Tribulations" begin. When this last issue takes place, there's not much time before the Day of Judgment arrives; i.e., Jesus' triumphant return as Lord and Master of all humankind (Matthew 12:36).

Now considering Eschatology in the light of the Great Tribulation, there are a number of views theologians put forth. Some say believers in Christ will face Parousia before those dreaded times. Some say that disciples of Christ will face the initial horror of Jesus' coming Judgment, then face Parousia. Then



there's the idea of believers enduring the Troubles while seeing Jesus descend from the sky.

Some bit of explanation here. That period of Jesus' rule on earth is the Millennium, or 1,000 years. Again, some theologians assert a "Premillennial" view: Parousia before the Tribulations.

There's also the "Postmillennial" view: Parousia after the Millennium. Then there's the "Amillennial" view that the imperfect church of Christ's disciples will experience their "millennium" in heaven with Jesus, not on earth.

But what does all that Biblical something or other have to do with you going to be with the Lord? Nothing. Absolutely nothing...if you're not ready for your Savior...now. He's advised us to watch and pray (1 Peter 4:7). Are you doing that? No judgment from me or others with your preparation—or not—to meet the Lord. But if Jesus IS your savior, what's holding up your readiness for Him?

On September 8, 1970, his 20th birthday, James Henderson was deployed to Vietnam for his first tour of duty. 50 years later, on September 8, 2018, James and his wife, RoAnn, flew to Gettysburg, Pennsylvania to see his brothers in arms for their Vietnam Veterans Reunion.

The 108th Group 2nd Battalion 94th Artillery LZ Nancy C-2 1966-1972 Defenders of the DMZ Reunion was the first time that James had seen the men that he had fought with in Vietnam years ago.

James wasn't sure what the reunion would be like, or if anyone would remember him. That all changed when one of his buddies greeted him at the door and remembered him by the nickname he had given him.

Other guys from his battalion were standing there looking at pictures from their days in Vietnam. RoAnn overheard them talking about one guy whose name they couldn't remember. As she registered and said her last name, all of the guys started yelling ya that's him, where is Henderson? They were all excited to see each other and

soon all of the guys were hugging each other amd it seemed like they had never been apart at all.

During the trip the guys from the battalion were able to visit with Retired Lieutenant General Richard Trefry. Trefry had started the battalion and took it to Vietnam in 1966. They were also able to visit the War College in Gettysburg and tour the facility.

This battalion meets every year in a different location to reconnect those brave soldiers who fought in Vietnam. James and RoAnn plan to never miss a reunion again.
