Don Suchy of Valparaiso was elected and installed as the Commander of the Nebraska American Legion during the 104th Annual Convention held June 24 - 26, 2022, in Columbus.

Suchy is eligible for The American Legion through his service in the Nebraska Air National Guard during the Vietnam War era, where he was a Jet Engine Mechanic. He has been a member of The American Legion and Post 371 for 36 years. Suchy has served as Department Senior Vice-Commander, District 7 Commander, District 7 Vice-Commander, County Vice-Commander, County Vice-Commander, Post Commander, and Post-Vice Commander. He also served as the Sons Squadron Vice-Commander and Commander.

He has held many committee appointments at the National level including the National Children and Youth Committee, National Children and Youth Vice Chairman, National Children and Youth Advisory Committee, and member of the Child Welfare Board of Directors. The book Crossing Over is the story of the rejection one woman faced when she fell in love with a person outside the Amish Community and ran away to marry him. Ruth Garrett had always been a little rebellious, but not even she could imagine the pain she was about to experience from being shunned by her family and community.

Arnold Palmer played his last Masters Tournament in 2002. Palmer, who won the Masters in 1958, 1960, 1962, and 1964, had seen his game slip away with age and his stardom fade with the rise of Tiger Woods and Phil Nicholson. A reporter asked Palmer, "Why did you do it? Why did you quit?" Palmer replied, "I didn't want to get the letter that former champions Ford, Brewer, and Casper have received asking them to step down."

Whether it's that girl in elementary school who looked at you in disdain when you offered her Valentine's card, or the boss that suggests you are not included in the company's new plans, rejection hurts. It causes pain.

I have never seen so much rejection of a group of Veterans as the rejection that was given to the Vietnam Veterans when they came back to the United States from Vietnam. They were called "baby killers" and spit upon, others protested, shamed them, and were unwelcomed back to their own country. Many who could not take the rejection committed suicide, some became recluses, others antisocial and some turned to alcohol and drugs to deal with rejection. Mental problems abounded, and most were told to toughen up and bear it like a man. PTSD was not even heard of in those days. I have always heard of Vietnam Vets as; "the forgotten veterans." For years and years, these men and women suffered quietly and withdrew from society; we know rejection hurts, it changes lives and relationships. It causes pain and withdrawal.

Great strides have been made to help these men and women to overcome their hurt, rejection, and illnesses. The Veterans Administration has programs to help all veterans in place now to help better these men and women who are afflicted with PTSD. For some, it is too late. They have tried to solve their problems in ways that have destroyed their lives.

Please pray for these men and women in their journeys to recovery. Recognize them as heroes and thank them for their sacrifices. Honor them as veterans who added to the freedom that we now live with today.

My challenge to you is to seek out the Vietnam Veterans, thank them personally for their sacrifices, and allow them to know that you care. Show them that, even though it has been a long time, they are still heroes. Most of these men and women are in their late 60s and 70s in age. Treat them like those that came back from Iraq, with honor and thankfulness.

Upcoming Virtual Claims Clinic

County Veteran Service Officers (CVSO) and the State Service Office will be working with the Lincoln VA Regional Office to hold another Virtual Claims Clinic in August 2022. Dates to be determined. If you have a service-connected disability claim (to include blue water) or pension claim pending with VBA exceeding 125 days, I recommend you contact your CVSO to check if he/she will be submitting it for review during August virtual claims clinic. Virtual claims clinics allow for rating of claims if ready as well as scheduling exams and problem-solving issues that may be holding up the claim.

Nebraska Women Veterans' Symposium

If you have not already heard there will be a women veterans' symposium held September 24-25, 2022, at the Holiday Inn Hotel and Convention Center in Kearney, Nebraska. This is a free two-day event with an agenda packed full of dynamic presenters, topics, special activities, and more. The event is centered around empowering Nebraska's female veterans, by connecting them with each other to build a network of support, providing education on benefits and resources available to them, and for those providing services to female veterans to learn how to better serve our female veterans. The keynote speaker will be our very own, Denise Rohan, past National Commander of The American Legion, Rohan is the first woman to be elected to the top position of The American Legion.

The symposium will have presenters from the Nebraska-Western Iowa Healthcare System (NWIHS), Veterans Benefits Administration, Women Veterans Program Manager for NWIHS, Homeless Veteran Coordinator, Vet Center, and Education/ Veteran Readiness and Employment (VR&E) to name a few. A few of the topics to be covered during the symposium include "What's new with women veterans' health?", Suicide/Crisis Prevention, Military Sexual Trauma and PTSD, Interpersonal (Domestic) Violence, and Peer Support. There will be a "Panel Discussion" on "Celebrating Who I Was and Who I've Become." There are some special activities planned to include a screening of the "Lioness" (which tells the story of a group of female Army support soldiers who were assigned to accompany the Marine Infantry on patrols in the streets of Ramadi). 
New Life Insurance Program by USDVA for Veterans **Receiving Disability Compensation**

Beginning in January 2023, VA will begin accepting applications for their new Veterans Affairs Life Insurance (VALife). VALife offers guaranteed acceptance to whole life insurance coverage. The VALife program is available to Veterans up to the age of 80 with any level of service-connected disability rating (0%-100%). Veterans who are age 81 and older may apply for VALife if they receive a new service-connected disability rating and apply within two years of receiving the new rating. VA reports that there will be instant approvals through a fully automated online enrollment process with no medical requirements for enrollment. 

August 1932 (90 years ago)

- In commemoration of the last Indian battle fought on North American soil, the <u>TRENTON</u> post of the Legion staged a big Pow-Wow festival for four days in early August. Baseball games, dancing, free acts, elaborate fireworks, and other entertainment were on the program. Ceremonials were put on each afternoon and evening by <u>SIOUX</u> Indians, descendants of the band which massacred a hunting party of <u>PAWNEES</u> near the present site of Trenton years ago.
- Quick action and knowledge of **SWIMMING** enabled Alex **DEMITROFF**, a member of Lincoln Post 3, to save his wife and son from the likelihood of drowning near Milford. His son was wading in the river when he accidentally got into deep water. Mrs. Demitroff jumped in to help her son although neither could swim. Demitroff then plunged in and brought both to shore.

July/August 1942 (80 years ago)

- Members of <u>INDIANOLA</u> Post No. 344 voted unanimously against the suggestion that veterans of the present war be invited to join the American Legion. Members of <u>ALMA</u> Post No. 118 favored making younger veterans eligible to the Legion, provided the difference in ages does not make interests too divergent.
- When the greatest spectacle in the country today, "This is your <u>ARMY</u>," the big Army show comes to <u>OMAHA</u> during the same week in which the Department convention is to be held, special attention is going to be paid to Legionnaires and their ladies, as some of the choicest seats in the <u>CREIGHTON</u> University, site of the show, will be reserved especially for Legionnaires on Tuesday evening, August 25.
- At an open-air meeting held in the Sargent City Park on July 27, the new charter was presented to Post No. 104. This post is now chartered for <u>SARGENT</u> and <u>TAYLOR</u> and is designed to include all <u>LOUP</u> county veterans.



Major Harold Kahler

Harold Kahler was raised in Lincoln, Nebraska, and took pilot training in Lubbock, Texas, where he received his wings in 1943. He trained pilots during World War II. After the War, Kahler was a member of the Nebraska Air National Guard and called to active duty during the Korean War and remained on active duty afterward.

Major Harold Kahler was the pilot of an F105D Thunderchief, nicknamed "Thud." It was the first supersonic tactical fighterbomber designed from scratch, and the largest single-seat, single-engine combat aircraft in history. Kahler was sent on a mission over Laos on June 14, 1969. His aircraft was the number two plane (wingman) in a flight of two. The flight was trying to locate about 20 trucks on a highway in northwest Laos but were unable to do so. They located a bridge in the target area and were given permission to release their ordinance on the bridge. The lead aircraft rolled in on the target followed by Kahler. As the lead F105 was coming off the target he saw a flash of light. The bridge and location of the loss were in the densely wooded mountains of northern Laos, which were laced with multiple primary and secondary roads and trails that comprised the major transportation network in this part of Laos. Small villages were occasionally found scattered throughout the region.

The lead aircraft immediately tried to contact Kahler by radio but was unsuccessful. He had enough fuel to make just one pass over cloud coverage and monsoon weather but did not see a parachute indicating Kahler ejected from his aircraft.

The Sam Neua area of Northern Laos was the birthplace of the Communist Pathet Lao Government. This well-established and long-standing enemy stronghold, with its extensive cave complex, was well noted for caves in which American prisoners of war were held during the war. After the plane went down, a team reached the site and found the cockpit of the plane empty with no parachutes either inside or on the ground nearby. It was thought at the time that Kahler was working his way to a safer area where he could be rescued. The plane itself was in fair condition considering the violent impact. This information was given to one of Kahler's family members during an information-seeking trip to Laos. The relative was able to see the jungle area near the crash.

On June 14, the Pathet Lao acknowledged shooting down an F105 and stated that the pilot was "suitably punished." The mission had been Kahler's 81st combat mission. The aircraft went down about 18 miles northeast of Sam Neua. Nothing has been learned of Harold Kahler's fate since that time.

Kahler is one of nearly 600 Americans who were lost in Laos. While the U.S. has limited diplomatic relations with the communist government of Laos, it has failed to negotiate the freedom of those American prisoners or the return of their remains.

Membership Minute Steve Bartos, Membership Chairman

There's no good way or any good reason to disguise what happened. The 2022 membership campaign has not been one of our best. At this time of year, we normally are in the top 20 departments in membership achievement. This year, we have about 40 departments that have done better than Nebraska. At least five departments have achieved 100% of their goal.

I know some folks had problems with MyLegion. I know that national had problems and failed to give Nebraska one of the scheduled renewal notices. Who really knows what caused the significant underperformance this year? For sure, while our "renewal rate" exceeded 90%, that wasn't enough to get us where we need to be.

Regardless, on behalf of PDC Benes and the Department Membership Committee, I do extend thanks to everyone who put forth some effort, large or small, to do the best we could. It's time now for a fresh start for 2023. Keep working on the members who have not renewed for 2022 but get fired up for 2023.

The 2023 Direct Renewal notices from Indianapolis are scheduled to be mailed in the July 1-8 time period. They help considerably in getting us off to a good start, but they do not and never will replace personal contact when it comes to finding and recruiting new members or renewing those current members who are sitting on the fence looking for an excuse not to renew.

The "Find Members in My Area" function in MyLegion remains a good source of Legionnaires who may want to transfer into a local post. They will be receiving dues notices, too, and may be inclined to renew and transfer into a local post if they receive some personal contact **NOW**. If they have already renewed in Post 500, they still can be invited to transfer.

If you make it your routine through the year to check the Post 500 list regularly (every month or so, perhaps), you should be able to identify the newest additions in your area. They may be the best prospects to transfer if you can contact them just after they joined the American Legion.

Another thing that needs to be done regularly is the transmittal of dues to Department Headquarters. Please process your regular renewals as soon as you start receiving them. Establish some kind of regular schedule for transmitting them, and don't hold on to them forever!!

There is an "Early Bird" incentive for the individual "regular" Legionnaire who pays his or her dues early, \$500 worth of incentive this year. Any "regular" member whose dues are paid AND transmitted (postmarked) to Department Headquarters by September 6th shall be in a drawing for \$500. Legionnaires, pay your dues promptly. Adjutants, make sure you send them in! (A similar drawing for \$150 for Department Life and PUFL members will be made in January.)

Let's try to start building some momentum and get this membership slide turned around!! Have a nice July.





Don't forget, it is the job of our generation to plant anything we can into the young minds, whether it be songs of the Bible, patriotic songs, stories of our ancestors.... My point is, God does not want us hiding our light under a bushel. Sing it loud, sing it proud, and if you're lucky, some three year old may just share her unbridled joy of her big girl day.
