

I am writing this article prior to my trip to Milwaukee, Wisconsin for the 50th Sons of The American Legion National Convention. It is always good to network with other



I attended the Grand Island ALR 3rd Annual Freedom Run on July 16th. It was a good turnout with approximately 65 bikes and 85 people attending. Our Department Adjutant, Dave Salak, had received a lot of Legacy Scholarship Awards and I will be handing them out. The following American Legion Rider Chapters received the 2021 American Legion Legacy Scholarship Awards: Commemorative Medallions: Kearney, St. Paul, Homer, Norfolk, Lincoln, Benson, and Edgar. Legacy Scholarship Award Plaques: Columbus has the 2021 plaque and Edgar has the 2020 plaque.

The 2022 Legacy Run Across Nebraska began on Friday, August 12 with 11 bikes and 12 riders. We stopped at Shoemakers Truck stop in Lincoln and then proceeded to Beatrice for our Lunch stop. Stopping at memorials to give homage to our Nebraska veterans is just one small thing we can do. We proceeded to Imperial and rode down the main street before their parade started getting waves and smiles from the kids. We headed to Venango for lunch at America's Crossroad, where we ate a very delicious lunch and rode a quarter of a mile to the State line and proceeded to Ogallala. We stopped in North Platte for fuel before ending our run at The Wall That Heals in Kearney at Patriot's Park.

It was a very enjoyable two-day ride through parts of Nebraska that I had not ridden through. The temperature was around 103 degrees by the time we got to McCook, but we rode for "the cause, not the applause." To date, we have raised \$1,600 with two chapters pledging donations after their meetings this month. September 1932 (90 years ago)

- When the boys of the <u>VERDEL</u> Legion band were getting ready to make their trip to <u>NORFOLK</u> convention, Mrs. Mary Jacot of Verdel thought they might possibly be hungry before they went far, so she baked them a loaf of <u>RYE</u> bread that was the grandpappy of all loaves. It tipped the scales at exactly ten- and one-half pounds.
- In one of the closest and cleanest <u>ELECTIONS</u> ever held by the Nebraska Department, Robert <u>ARMSTRONG</u> of Auburn, Department Judge Advocate during 1932, was elected as Department Commander for 1933, defeating <u>GOLDEN</u> Kratz of Sydney. It was an election between two men who were equally popular, who were fraternity brothers and close friends as only true Legionnaires can be.

September 1942 (80 years ago)

• Reaffirming its belief in the policy of the universal <u>DRAFT</u>, the Department Convention at Omaha adopted a <u>RESOLUTION</u> demanding immediate enactment of national legislation providing for drafting and conscription of all resources of the nation necessary to carry the <u>WAR</u> to a successful conclusion.

September 1952 (70 years ago)

- Evidence of the widespread interest in Nebraska's County **GOVERNMENT** Program is given in the July-August issue of "Case and Comment," a magazine for **LAWYERS** which is published in Rochester, NY. One of the leading articles on that issue is "Crusade in Nebraska," an interesting account of the program. Since the publication of this article, Department Headquarters has received letters from several states ordering copies of "County Government in Nebraska."
- <u>OMAHA</u> Post 1 retained its title of "the world's largest Legion post" by a narrow margin this year as <u>DENVER</u> followed in second place with less than 250 members. At the close of the <u>MEMBERSHIP</u> period June 30, 1952, Omaha has enrolled 11,717 members and Denver 11,475 members on its roll.

Corporal Daegan Page Matt Schnabel, Millard Post 374 Member

On June 30, 2022, members of the Millard American Legion Riders took part in the ceremony to honor the legacy of U.S. Marine Corporal Daegan Page. During this ceremony, an unveiling took place for the street that Cpl. Page grew up on (Honorary Cpl. Daegan Page Street) and Sarpy County Sheriff's Office announced the name of their newest K-9, Daegen. Cpl. Page graduated from Millard South High School and enlisted in January 2018. He served in the 2nd Battalion, 1st Marine Regiment based at Camp Pendleton, California. Cpl. Page was deployed to Afghanistan, helping Afghans at the Abbey Gate when he and 12 other soldiers lost their lives to a suicide bombing. He was only 23 years old when he gave his life, becoming a local American



hero. The Millard American Legion Riders of Post 374 were honored to support Corporal Daegen Pages' family, proving our favorite sayings, "It's all about our Veterans."

First Lieutenant Paul Magers

On June 1, 1971, First Lieutenant (1LT) Paul Magers, a pilot from Sidney, NE, and Donald L. Wann, Aircraft Commander from Shawnee, OK were on a mission in Northwest Quang Tri Province in South Vietnam (Grid Coordinates XD855454). They represented the Army as Company D, 158th Aviation Battalion, part of the 101st Airborne Division.

Magers was the pilot of an AH1G Cobra gunship 68-15002. Another aircraft had just successfully extracted a Ranger team from a landing zone, and Magers gunship was to destroy ammunition that had been in the area.

Witnesses saw tracer rounds hit the underside and tail section of the helicopter and saw the fire from escaping fuel. The aircraft nosed up, then lost air speed; appeared to shudder, then turned in flames. As the aircraft fell in an uncontrolled spiral pattern, six calls were made to Magers aircraft with no response. The aircraft crashed and slid down a steep hill before the ammunition on board started tearing apart what was left of the aircraft. All witnesses stated the crash was non-survivable. Up to that point, there had been no enemy fire. Magers was on his first or second mission after arriving in the country and started his tour on May 12, 1971.

Another pilot in the unit, Skip Butler clearly recalled the day when he heard that Magers and Wann's attack helicopter had been shot down. "I was flying my helicopter back to base for the night. On my radio, I heard, 'Give me the tail number of the aircraft that went down.' When it came back '002', the operations radio operator said, it was Wann and Magers."

In 1990, analysts from the Defense Prisoner of War/Missing Personnel Office, the Joint POW/MIA Accounting Command (JPAC), and their predecessor organizations interviewed both American and Vietnamese witnesses and produced leads for field investigations.

In 1993 and 1998, two US – Socialist Republic of Vietnam teams, led by JPAC, surveyed the suspected crash site, and found artifacts and debris consistent with a Cobra gunship. In mid-1999, another joint team excavated the site, but it stopped for safety reasons when the weather deteriorated. No remains were recovered, but the team did find wreckage associated with the specific crash they were investigating. The Vietnamese government subsequently declared the region within Quang Tri Province off limits to US personnel.

In 2008, as part of an agreement with JPAC, a Vietnamese team unilaterally excavated the site and recovered the human remains of Paul Magers, Donald Wann, and other artifacts. The Vietnamese returned to the site in 2009, expanded the excavation area, and discovered more remains and additional evidence.

Forensic analysis, circumstantial evidence, and the mitochondrial DNA match to the Magers and Wann families by the Armed Forces DNA Identification Laboratory confirmed the identification of the remains.

1LT Paul Gerald Magers's remains were interred on August 27, 2010, at Yellowstone County Veterans Cemetery in Laurel, Montana.

For God and Country, we advocate for veterans, educate our citizens, mentor youth, and promote patriotism, good citizenship, peace, and security."

I ask you to re-read our mission and write down how many purposes there could be for you. As for myself, I can

list fourteen different purposes. Now reflect on how many programs we promote throughout the year. I count as many as fourteen. Hmmmm.... fourteen purposes, fourteen programs. Is it a coincidence? Perhaps.

Now back to my initial question --- what is your purpose as an Auxiliary member? You have many possibilities. Maybe you like working with our youth. If so, you have many opportunities with our Americanism, Education, Poppy, and Junior programs. You might be someone who follows our National and State political issues. If so, then our Legislative program is for you. Are you a volunteer in your community? Then, there are a variety of areas within our Community Service that you could select as your purpose. I believe you get the idea.

where to find that "history tidbit?" Of course, the Cavalcade of Memories at our Headquarters in Lincoln. While doing my research there, I came across the message written by President Verna Bosely (1948-1949, Palisade), and her closing remarks fit perfectly for my message this month.

Membership Minute Steve Bartos, Membership Chairman

Hot, dry summer. No? The 2023 membership year is well underway, and it appears that we will be hitting the 50% National Target Date for September. It's too early to be able to put results in the Legionnaire, but your membership committee is hoping that the special prize award of \$500 that we established for this year's Early Bird Award yielded a much higher than normal turn-in by September 6th. Our hope was that it would help each posts establish some early momentum on renewals, and keep it going!!! I hope every post publicized it and followed up.

This year, the national organization established a membership goal for each department at 103% of its July 4th membership, essentially the same method that they used last year. And, like last year, their method remains quite aggressive. Regardless of their method, we have a national goal for 2023 of 24,835 members. Sadly, and quite disturbing, this year's goal is 1262 members LESS than our 2022 goal. And that goal was 881 members LESS than the 2021 goal. The declining goals are a direct reflection of our declining membership, and only we, all working together can do something about it!!

Also, as we did last year, I established individual post goals for 2023 that would result in our internal department goal is identical to the department goal established for us by the national organization. Except for 5 posts that were impacted by the influx of members transferred in from the former Ralston post, Headquarters Post 500, and 2 posts that had only 7 members, all the other posts' goals were established at 1 or 2 members above their membership on 7/31.

I suggest that, for sure, there are 2 things that must happen for any department to have a chance to reach its assigned goal. Renewals are a must. Nebraska does fairly well and renews at a rate in excess of 90%. We need to increase that percentage. We know that 100% is unrealistic, but we can increase the rate if EVERY post gets involved and is a little bit more relentless in pursuit of the renewals. The renewal notice is nice; but, if the renewal hasn't come in by now, start thinking about some follow-up.

Getting new members on your roster is the second thing that must happen. You can't argue there are no veterans to ask. National headquarters research indicates that Nebraska has a veteran population of 118,000. We have about 24,000 of them. Do the math. On August 8th, there were 900 Legionnaires in our Headquarters Post 500 who were still encumbered to the national organization and had not yet renewed for 2023. And they can be renewed and transferred to your post (and count toward your goal). And you can use MyLegion.org to identify them! There are another 200 members who are not encumbered. The same goes for them. Renew and Transfer. But you have to reach out to them. The 2023 Membership Awards are posted on the website. Please look at them.

It's Never too Late to Honor Our Veterans

Wayne W. Gerlach, a World War II combat veteran of the European Theater of Operations was presented his awards and decorations at his American Legion Post on August 8, 2022. He is a member of Cowles Post 116. Mr. Gerlach celebrated his 98th birthday on July 27, 2022.

His awards and decorations include the Combat Infantry Badge, Bronze Star Medal, U.S. Army Good Conduct Medal, American Campaign Medal, European-African-Middle East Campaign Medal with two bronze campaign service stars, World War Two Victory Medal; marksmanship badges for the M-1 Rifle, .30 caliber Machinegun, and 81-millimeter mortar; World War II Honorable Service Lapel Pin; 222nd Infantry Regimental Combat Citation. He was a machine gunner assigned to Company F, 222nd Infantry Regiment, 42nd Infantry Division.

Gerlach was presented his awards and decorations in a framed display which also included his ribbon rack of five ribbons representing the five medals he received along with his 42nd Infantry Rainbow Division shoulder patch and 7th Army Shoulder patch.

Gerlach was drafted into the U.S. Army on his 20th birthday and completed infantry basic training at Camp Wolters, TX. Following a short furlough, he sailed for France and joined his unit as a replacement soldier in the Battle of the Bulge concluding in January 1945. The 42nd Infantry Division had suffered heavy losses in that campaign. Gerlach's division then fought into Germany through Wertheim, Miltonberg, Wurzburg, Schweinfurt, Furth, and Donauworth. Several of his buddies in his unit were killed or wounded. Gerlach was also wounded in the town of Donauworth but the wound was

classified as "non-hostile" since it was caused by a bullet accidentally fired from a captured German pistol by a fellow U.S. Soldier. The bullet shattered the fibula bone in his right leg and badly damaged the muscles in his lower leg. Gerlach was evacuated to France on a C-47 aircraft where he received further medical care and then flown to England for further treatment. Then he was shipped to the U.S. aboard a hospital ship and on to Camp Carson, CO by train for more treatment and physical therapy. He was honorably discharged from the U.S. Army in September 1945. Following WW II, he became an electrician and rural mail carrier. He still lives independently in Cowles and enjoys driving his car.

The medals presentation was made possible through the efforts of Liberty Commander Charles Barr, who initiated a request for Gerlach's awards through U.S. Senator Deb Fischer. Barr took an interest in Gerlach's combat service and asked him if he'd ever received the medals and badges that he'd earned. When Gerlach replied that he had not, Barr started the process. Chase Kratochvil, military liaison for Sen Fischer, saw that Gerlach's request was sent to the National Personnel Records Center. Barr coordinated the presentation through Webster County Veterans Service Officer Gary Ratzlaff and Cowles Commander Jack Klingenberger.



What Does the Passing of the PACT Act Mean For Veterans?

The passing of the Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics (PACT) Act is incredibly important for our brothers and sisters who have been exposed to environmental toxins such as burn pits. This opens the door for veterans to receive healthcare and other benefits associated with exposures to toxins



by expanding and extending eligibility for VA health care to Veterans of the Vietnam, Gulf War, and post-9/11 eras. The Act is supportive of 23 new presumptive conditions for burn pits and other toxic exposures, adds more presumptive-exposure locations for Agent Orange and radiation, and requires VA to provide a toxic exposure screening to every Veteran enrolled in VA health care. For post-9/11 combat veterans, the bill extends the period of time they have to enroll in VA health care from five years to 10 years post-release from active duty. For combat veterans who do not fall within that window, the bill also creates a one-year open enrollment period. This will allow for more veterans without service-connected disabilities to enroll in VA health care.

Beyond VA health care the PACT Act adds 23 more presumptive conditions to the existing 3 (asthma, rhinitis, and sinusitis) and possibly more if the VA Secretary determines another condition(s) is warranted based on a positive association with certain substances, chemical, or airborne hazard(s). The PACT Act adds the following presumptive conditions: head cancer of any type, neck cancer of any type, respiratory cancer of any type, gastrointestinal cancer of any type, reproductive cancer of any type, lymphoma cancer of any type, lymphoma tic cancer of any type, kidney cancer, brain cancer, melanoma, granulomatous disease (disorder associated with white blood cells). The importance of the addition of these presumptive conditions is this should greatly reduce the amount of information necessary in the submission of disability claims and exams, resulting in veterans' claims being processed quicker and thus the veteran receiving their earned benefits sooner. Survivors of veterans who have died due to one of these conditions may also be eligible for benefits. The bill "provides VA with mechanisms to enhance claims processing and to increase the workforce" which indicates the Veterans Benefits Administration should soon be pushing to hire personnel to deal with the increase in presumptive disability claims. Every day VA waits to begin the hiring of sufficient personnel will determine the true timeliness of claims processing and the backlog of presumptive claims for veterans. There still is much unpacking of this legislation for Veteran Service Officers (VSO) to do to be able to fully assist veterans in applying for VA benefits.

The bill also directs the Secretary to convene a new interagency working group to develop a five-year strategic plan on toxic exposure research. There are also resources being devoted to investing in VA health care facilities by authorizing 31 major medical health clinics and research facilities in 19 states. The takeaway is if you've been exposed, you should consider scheduling a meeting with a VSO.
