The Nebraska American Legion Family is happy to announce that there is a new Department Headquarters building. After two and a half years of searching, the Building Committee was able to purchase a new location that checked all of the boxes that were voted on by the Legion and Auxiliary Department Executive Committees at the Department Convention in June 2021. Commander Don Suchy and Finance Officer Mark Novak signed the purchase papers for the new building on April 3rd.

The new location is 150 NW 40th Street – Lincoln and was previously the AKRS Equipment Building. The building is located on West O Street and about half of a mile from Interstate 80, which provides easier access for anyone coming to Headquarters. The new location is all on one level and a large parking lot. The new building will have a joint history museum that includes items from both

history collections. Once the museum is finished being setup, we hope many of you are able to stop and see it.

Another exciting item is that the previous Headquarters that was located at 5600 P Street was sold on May 17th and the new tenants are busy remodeling the building to open up for their new business in September. The decision to sell the building wasn't an easy one, but

there were many projects needing attention to include the front steps, the driveway/parking lot, furnace, etc.



#### **Update on PACT Act Claims.**

As of April 3, 2023, VA had received 445,538 total PACT Act claims of which 11,860 were submitted by a surviving dependent. Of the total PACT Act claims submitted 203,267 claims had been completed, 199,162 veteran claims and 4,105 survivor PACT Act related claims. Currently PACT Act claims are averaging 157.6 days to complete, with only 44.7% of PACT Act claims being completed by the 125 days VA claims completion goal. In comparison to Non-PACT Act related claims are being completed on average 131.7 days or 66.5% of new Non-PACT Act Claims are being completed within the 125 days VA goal for completing new claims.

Reminder to contact your local service officer prior to August 2023, to submit your claim for PACT Act presumptive conditions on or before August 10, 2023 to ensure you receive the most beneficial effective date. While there is no specific deadline to file a claim for PACT Act presumptive conditions, those PACT Act claims filed prior August 10, 2023, will be assigned an effective date of August 10, 2022. Your local service officer can explain the more on the PACT Act and the more than 20 different presumptive conditions added by the passing of the PACT Act August 10, 2022

Remember to ask your service officer about the benefits to enrolling in VA health care if you are not currently enrolled.

#### Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP) and Nebraska Income Tax

Recently there has been scuttlebutt going around the veteran community about the Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP) with some indicating SBP being taxable income and some indicating SBP is not being taxable income in Nebraska. To lay this scuttlebutt to rest, SBP is not taxable income according to the Nebraska Department of Revenue (NDOR). As of March 2023, NDOR updated their income tax information guide, "Nebraska Income Tax for U.S. Servicemembers, Their Spouses, and Civilians Working with U.S. Forces". Of, note, on page two (2) of this document SBP payments are clearly identified exempt from State of Nebraska income taxation. Below is an excerpt from this income tax information guide, page two (2), paragraph two (2).

"Military Retirement Benefit. Military retirement benefit is defined as "retirement benefits that are periodic payments attributable to service in the uniformed services of the United States for personal services performed by an individual prior to his or her retirement." Military retirement benefits attributable to uniformed service reported to the taxpayer on IRS Form 1099-R received from the United States Department of Defense (DOD) or the United States Office of Personnel Management (OPM) are excluded from Nebraska taxable income. The military retirement benefit exclusion provided in Neb. Rev. Stat. § 77-2716(15) includes retirement and annuity payments to a spouse, former spouse, or child that are based on another individual's military service provided the benefit is reported on the taxpayer's Form 1099-R issued by the DOD or OPM."

#### June 1943 (80 years ago)

- Making <u>KNIVES</u> for the use of American men fighting in the <u>JUNGLES</u> has been a project among several members of <u>FREMONT</u> post. These Legionnaires got hold of 450 inches of excellent knife steel and they have been turning out knives of the highest quality.
- Setting up a record for every other post in the state to shoot at, the **GEHRING** Post contributed \$169.50 this month to the fund the Department is raising to buy playing CARDS for men overseas. That amount will buy 600 decks of cards, each one of which will have the Legion emblem and greetings from the Gehring post printed in the back.
- 'Troop <u>TRAIN</u>! Clear the way for servicemen! Come this way! Coffee, cake, sandwiches, magazines! All free to <u>SERVICEMEN</u>!" So the voice of Buck Smith was heard over the public address system at the North Platte <u>CANTEEN</u> on Mother's Day. The blue and gold of Legionnaires mingled with the khaki of the Army and the blue of the Navy. The women of <u>GOTHENBURG</u> baked and decorated over 150 birthday cakes for the servicemen. About twelve troop trains carrying 4,000 or more troops were served during the day.
- Although no <u>PARADE</u> will be held at <u>NATIONAL</u> conventions of the Legion during the war, parade positions are being determined each year on the membership standings of the various Departments, and for the first parade held after the war, the average position for the parade-less years will determine where each Department will march. Nebraska won unusually high rank this year, placing <u>THIRD</u> in the entire country.

### June 1953 (70 years ago)

- Enough membership cards to exceed the entire total for 1952 were received at Department Headquarters on May 27, so every member from here on out is another boost to prove the trend of growing membership which started last year. The 1952 **MEMBERSHIP** of the Department wound up at 54,695 and on May 27 of this year, membership hit exactly 54,700.
- It's a good sign of health when ten candidates aspire for offices in the Nebraska American Legion. With still two months for more activity to take place along this line, it definitely appears that interest in the Department Convention will be maintained right up to the adjourning rap of the <u>GAVEL</u>. Much interest is created with <u>ELECTIONS</u> of this sort. The drama, spiced with suspense, will continue through the various roll calls until a full slate of officers has been elected.

My Mom's birthday is June 14th. Growing up we always quipped that all the flags were flying in her honor, and that we could never forget it was her birthday.



One must realize that the American Flag is more than a piece of jewelry worn or displayed to be fashionable. It should be worn and displayed with pride, and with the understand that person stands behind all it represents.

Just as the flag is a symbol of our country, each religion has symbols that represent it and its dogma. For Christianity, it's the cross; Judaism, the five-pointed star; for Muslims, the crescent of the moon with a star; and Buddhism, the Wheel of the Law (dharmachakra) to name a few. All these symbols are sacred to their respective religion and represent the core of their beliefs. 

This training will help all members from those that have just joined, to the ones who have been around since our founding in Nebraska. We all need to continue learning! Technical Sergeant Larry Jerome Newman entered the U.S. Air Force from North Platte, Nebraska, and was a member of the 16th Special Operations Squadron. On June 18, 1972, he was a gunner aboard an AC-130A gunship, tail number 55-0043, call sign Spectre 11; that took off from Ubon Airfield, Thailand on an armed mission near A Shau Valley, South Vietnam.

During the mission, at 2355 hours, the aircraft was hit by a surface to air missile (SAM) and went down near the border of Laos and Vietnam. The 15 man crew was on a night operational mission to attack elite NVA forces known to be in that area. Multiple emergency beepers were immediately heard by other US forces, and according to debriefing statements given by the three men who were rescued, a bailout order was given by the Pilot, and at least one additional parachute was observed by them. TSgt Newman was presumed killed in the crash, and his remains could not be recovered at the time.

The first loss coordinates, given to the families of the missing men, was in Laos not South Vietnam. That location was quickly changed, many believe because the war in Laos was considered to be "secret." Next of kin were never given an explanation for this abrupt change.

This AC130 was outfitted as a gunship, and was the most spectacular of the modified C130's. On some models, a computer automatically translated sensor data into instructions for the pilot, who kept his fixed, side firing guns trained on targets by adjusting the angle of bank as he circled. The crew of these planes were highly trained and capable. They were highly desirable "captures" for the enemy because of their technical knowledge.

In May 1994 the US conducted a crash sight investigation of the AC130A. To no one's surprise, they recovered approximately 300 bone chips and five teeth; and heralded this achievement as the successful recovery of all 12 unaccounted for crewmen. None of the bone chips could be identified as belonging to a specific crewman. When the families asked the mortician, who processed the bone chips, if DNA testing could be done on them to determine a positive identification, they were told it was not possible to do so. The DNA would have to be checked against the maternal line. When female family members offered their assistance for DNA testing, they were told no, it could not be done, because it would destroy the bone chips and there would be nothing left to bury. If there weren't enough bone chips to test, how can you rationally pretend there is evidence of death for one crewmember, let alone all twelve? There is still the question of which country they were actually lost in.

On November 17, 1994 a group burial of the comingled remains of the AC130A Spectre gunship crew was held at Arlington National Cemetery. While the US considers all these men to be "remains returned," some of the families do not. A large portion of the information is still classified.

Technical Sergeant Larry Jerome Newman is memorialized on the Courts for the Missing at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific.



# Membership Minute Steve Bartos, Membership Chairman

Ten years later, the national convention was held in Pittsburgh. Other than stumbling on to some very nice ties at a Labor Day sale that I just couldn't pass up, the excitement that year was the fact that the American Legion was celebrating its return to a membership of more than 3,000,000 members.

Now --- 30 years after the Pittsburg convention --- we are headed to Charlotte hoping to report that we have achieved a national goal of a little more than 1,500,000 members. A significant number is still needed to reach the 2023 goal; and even if we are fortunate enough to make it, it would still represent a 50% decline in membership in the last 30 years.

The decline that we've experienced since 1993 is about 50,000 members per year. I'm not exactly sure when the Legion's Direct Mail Solicitation (DMS) program began, but it's been quite a while. And, over the years, it has probably generated 50,000 to 100,000 members per year (the number of letters sent out varied each year) Do the math. Look where we would be without it.

What our organization needs is a Mt. St. Helens of its own. We need to create a volcanic eruption in interest in keeping the American Legion alive and well. We just cannot keep suffering a 10% decline in membership every year.

The first thing every individual Legionnaire needs to do if you aren't already a PUFL or Department Life member is to promptly renew your membership when the first renewal notices come out in July. None of us can control the loss of members to Post Everlasting, but we can control our own active memberships.

The second thing that every individual Legionnaire can do is to help recruit new members or reinstate former members. New and reinstated members are absolutely the key to replacing members who have passed away. Friends? Relatives? Coworkers? We know that there are veterans amongst us who are not members, and they need to be asked.

Members who join online or are recruited by the national organization via the DMS program are placed in the department's Headquarters Post 500, and they are "encumbered" to the national organization for 3 years. However, members in each post with the proper credentials can identify them --- and they are fair game to be contacted --- and then "transferred" or "renewed and transferred" into a local post.

The Department Convention is upon us, and I look forward to seeing some of you there.

Keep working on the 2023 renewals. Start planning how you can get your volcano to erupt for 2024!!







# HAPPY 100TH BIRTHDAY, ADELINE BROWN!!


